

The Board of County Commissioners of Walton County, Florida, met in regular session on this Tuesday, February 9th, 1932, with the following members present and participating,- L. F. Cawthon, Chairman, H. Lancaster, J. E. Bowers, ~~H. H.~~ H. Crook, and L E Laird, being all the members of said Board and M T Fountain, Clerk.

W. T. Ray, Tax Collector filed his report of Polls collected for the month of January, 1932, showing \$64.00 collected, and his report of licenses collected for the same period showing \$24.00 collected for the State and \$7.50 for Walton County.

Mitchell Wilkins, Farm Agent and Eloise McGriff, Home Agent filed their reports for the month of January which was examined and filed for future information.

In accordance with Section 1452 of the present Pension Law, the County Commissioners examined list of Pensioners now receiving pensions in this county, and in their opinion found none not entitled to a pension.

A Petition signed by Andrew Teal, Marion Teal and sundry other citizens, asking the Board to allow the closing of all roads, excepting the public road entering the Southwest corner of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of SE $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec 36 Tp 4 N R 19 W, and running by home of J H Herring in a Northeast direction through said forty or quarter of land, and the Board having considered the same and statement made by Mr M T King who presented the petition, upon motion made by Comr. L E Laird, seconded by Comr. H. Crook, and duly carried by unanimous vote, it was ordered that said petition be granted.

M. Wilkins, County Farm Agent, appeared before the Board and recommended that said Board purchase a machine to terrace land owned by Mr. T S Meritt of Argyle, stating that he had been using same for two or three years and it was in good condition, upon motion made and carried it was ordered that said Board purchase said machine for \$15.00.

Mr. B. M. Askew and J P Richardson, partners doing business as Freeport Naval Stores Company, appeared before the Board in regard to 2468.79 acres of land in Sections 2, 3, 4, 10, Tp 2 S R 19W and Sections 26, 27, 34 & 35 Tp 4 S R 19W known as the Cessna lands, and asked the Board to allow them to begin working the timber for turpentine purposes, they agreeing to pay \$100.00 cash, \$200.00 May 1st, \$200.00 June 1st and balance of 1930 taxes on July 1, 1932, and after considerable discussion pro and con, the following resolution was offered,-

WHEREAS, there are outstanding Tax certificates against certain lands particularly described in the schedule attached to the original draft of this resolution and which is, by reference thereto, made a part hereof, for the unpaid taxes of 1930, and in addition the 1931 taxes thereon are unpaid, although not yet delinquent, and

WHEREAS, B. M. Askew and J. P. Richardson, partners doing business as Freeport Naval Stores Company, desire to work the timber upon said lands for turpentine purposes and have proposed to make payment of said delinquent and past due taxes, in installments as follows:- \$100.00 cash, upon adoption of this resolution, subject to approval of the Comptroller of the State; \$200.00, May 1st, 1932; \$200.00, June 1st, 1932, the balance on July 1st, 1932, covering the 1930 taxes, and to pay the 1931 taxes thereon before the sale thereof for unpaid taxes, and

WHEREAS, this Board is agreeable to said arrangement provided, same is approved by the Comptroller of the State,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board does hereby consent for said Freeport Naval Stores Company to work said timber for turpentine purposes so long as the payments above mentioned are made as and when due, as stated in the preamble hereof, but no longer, and that in default of such payments or either of them, as and when due as herein before provided, then this Board shall, at its option, proceed to enjoin any further working of said timber, or take such other action it may deem advisable in the premises, provided, that upon receipt of any money hereunder, the Clerk of the Circuit Court shall apply the same to the redemption and cancellation of such certificates as the payment or payments shall cover from time to time, in full, and provided further, that this resolution shall be submitted to and approved by the Comptroller of the

State before the same shall become effective.

Upon motion of Comr. H. Crook, seconded by Comr. J E Bowers and duly carried by unanimous vote of all members of said Board, the above and foregoing resolution was adopted.

Moved by Comr. H. Lancaster, seconded by Comr. L E Laird and duly carried by unanimous vote, it was ordered that this Board recommend to the State Pardon Board a CONDITION PARDON for Amos Dean who was convicted in county Judge's Court on July 9th, 1931 of Petit Larceny.

Mr. D S Sellars appeared before the Board and asked the Board to allow him to cut the timber on lands now in State Tax Certificates on which he has a timber lease and to work timber on lands now in State Tax Certificates on which he has turpentine lease, without requiring him to pay the State and County taxes, stating to the Board that he refers to small parcels of land and on which the leases are about to expire, the Board agreed to consider his request when the Board was furnished with more information, and if it was within their power to do so.

Mr John Carter appeared before the Board with a petition signed by several people asking the Board to allow him to change the right-of-way thru his 160 acres in Sec 32 Tp 4 N R 20W so the road would be on the North line of said 160 acres, the said petition and request was referred to Comr. Lancaster for his information and recommendation to this Board for future action.

Justice of the Peace Bond of A. B. Mitchell, \$500.00 for Justice District No.6, with Ernest Adams and A D Mayo as sureties was approved as required by law.

B D W Rushing appeared before the Board with a certificate from Dr R B Spires stating that he was unable to perform manual labor and asked the Board to allow him the \$500.00 exemption, the matter was referred to Hon. D Stuart Gillis, County Attorney and Attorney for this Board and he was advised that it was not the intention of the law to allow the exemption to a person just because he was unable to perform manual labor.

Hon. D. Stuart Gillis, Attorney for this Board, discussed with the Board reports made to him in regard to W A Hall Lumber Company cutting the timber on Sections 30 & 31 Tp 1 N R 19W the same having been posted and now appearing in State Tax Certificates, and he was instructed to proceed as heretofore ordered by this Board.

Letter from P. M. Wilkerson regard to road from State Road No.60, thru Wilkerson settlement to Alabama State line near the Eracewell place, was discussed and Comr. Lancaster was instructed to negotiate with Jackson Lumber Company for help to build this road and pay the expense thereof out of the Road and Bridge Bond moneys now on hand.

The Clerk then read the minutes of the meetings of this Board held on January 6th & 19th, 1932, upon motion made by Comr. L E Laird, seconded by Comr. H. Lancaster and duly carried by unanimous vote, it was ordered that said minutes be approved as read by the Clerk.

RESOLUTION offered and its adoption moved by Commissioner H. Crook, seconded by Commissioner H. Lancaster.

BE IT RESOLVED, by this Board that that certain resolution adopted by Northwest

Florida Association at Crestview, Florida, on December 17th, 1931, relative to the budget of the State Road Department for maintenance, betterment and new construction during 1932, in Walton County, Florida, does not represent the wishes and desires of the members of this board in their official or private capacity, nor of a great majority of their respective constituents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the members of this Board in both the representative and private capacity, does hereby earnestly protest the proposed penalization of Walton County and its citizenship on account of the exercise by one or more of its citizens of his or their constitutional right to submit to the courts what he or they consider to be a just grievance, or to seek relief through the proper channels from what he or they conceive to be unjust and illegal treatment by any department of our State Government.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Board does hereby insist that State Road No 10 with its unconstructed bridges in and adjoining Walton County, is a part of the second preferential system of State Roads the completion of which was contemplated by the Legislature to be undertaken by the State Road Department, as a trunk line highway, and without any assistance from the counties traversed thereby; that Walton County, without any binding obligation to do so, but in order to expedite the earlier completion of the project issued its bonds from the proceeds of which nearly three hundred thousand dollars was appropriated and made available to the State Road Department to be used in the construction of said road in said county and the necessary bridges therefor; That the proposed Choctawhatchee River Bridge, the construction of which is made the basis of the suggestion of said association that Walton County's interest be practically entirely disregarded, is only partially in Walton County, two-thirds thereof being in Washington County, from which no aid has been derived for the construction of said road, and is, therefore, not to be considered a part of Walton County, but if so, for which Walton County has already contributed the sum of \$50,000.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That this Board should and does hereby urge the State Road Department to include in its 1932 budget of maintenance, betterments and new construction, all reasonable items for Walton County, and that said county nor State Road No.10, be discriminated against as recommended by said Northwest Florida Association in said resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be furnished the State Road Department, the Board of County Commissioners of Washington and Bay Counties, and the said Northwest Florida Association.
